# ANXIETY IN EDUCATION

phobias: <u>unrealistic fear</u> relationship issues lose confidence

about <u>37%</u> college students experienced anxiety (21-22, Health Minds Study)

Long-term damage drop-outs <u>negative notions</u> about school



can be easy to miss or overlook / insensitivity

STT = Student Talk Time Keywords: feelings, prompt feedback, feel heard, solve problems



# HOW TO START STT 1:

### Example vs. Non-example

- One correct solution vs. incorrect solution
- Students can choose the correct solution and
  - explain why.
- Other students can agree or disagree.


