Without my classes, I would have been really lonely...and our students would have been isolated too.

When I think of the community resources that we were able to tell our students about, that really made our classes essential. Food banks and hygiene pickups, etc. Those were real/authentic needs. Getting students vaccinated/tested/etc. Were also real needs. We regularly connect our students to community resources like the library, other classes, medical facilities, job fairs, etc.
